### On a Starry Night

Stars, glistening diamonds on the black velvet of night fall slowly across the western sky. One can not help but notice the multitude of lights in the sky.

Ah, sweet mystery of life.

We all look up from time to time and wonder. How far is infinite? How long is forever?

I read a little passage in some philosophy book randomly pulled from the library shelf, "Space is infinite and time is eternal."

How can that be? In our mortal and limited view of life, there must be a beginning, an end. What is on the other side? How can it be infinite. Every look at the night sky makes me wonder.

I was not inspired by wood-working this month as much as appreciating life and each day as it comes. I hope you have and take the time to savor a moment now and then. A rainbow, dew on a flower, a kitten or puppy just starting down the path of life.

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I've heard it said by other aging eyes, so it's not just me. "I need more light on tools in the shop." A 'clamp lamp' on most every tool in the shop makes a difference in seeing the finer details. One place lacking that finally dawned on me is the rip fence cursor on that table saw.

Of course! More light WOULD make it easier to read those fine lines. I work to precision, splitting the line, and I love the fact that my saw lives up to that kind of accuracy.

Poking around the internet yielded nothing about table cursor lights. I submitted a product suggestion to Rockler. I heard back from them a couple of days later that the idea made the cut list, to be discussed as a future product.

It will be discussed. Ironically I was at the store earlier that day and stumbled across this 35mm Puck Light. Designed



to fit in a 35mm door-hinge pocket, it begged of a 'try me' solution. It was cheap enough at \$8.99 to take home.

Holding it over the cursor where it needed to be mounted led in moments to fashioning a bracket out of a simple 1/2" wide iron strap. In five minutes, drilled,

## SHOP NEWS—PROJECTS

These last two months have seen fairly light activities in the shop maintenance/upgrade department, due in part planning, and vacation plans. There were no maintenance nights in September. However a number of things have been accomplished due to efforts of our various members.

We raised the air compressor about 4 inches and added a drain outlet that makes it much easier to take care of and service. We started stripping the finish on the office desk that was donated for the Library/office/break room. Thanks to Chip Webster for providing the expertise, materials and most of the effort to date.

A great deal of progress has been made cleaning up the Annex and we can once again get to the users project storage areas. Thanks to Gig Lewis, Packard Phillips, and other members of the Estate team,

We also replaced the defective overhead lights with new LED versions with great light output, and carrying a 5 year guarantee; 12 fixtures for about \$26 each. Thanks to Jim O'Rourke who provided the technical expertise and did most of the work.

bent and mounted under one of the cursor screws, there was light. FANTASTIC.

The light has an infrared motion sensor, so any time I move near it, it turns on for 10 seconds. FANTASTIC.

It's a little too sensitive so a little experimenting with tape shields reduced it to sensitivity only when I touch the cursor. FANTASTIC.

The magnet on its back makes it simple to install or remove and used somewhere else.

I did send a photo to Rockler to kick off their discussion. I hope we'll see a magnetically attached one in the near future.

This little light suggests use in a lot of other areas of the shop where you walk up to the tool (e.g. drill press) and the little light turns on.

## COOL, CLEAR MORTISING JIG

I'm a big fan of the loose tenon. Carefully done, it's fast and alignment of the mating pieces is perfect. A current project needed a jig with a slot wider than my existing jigs. They are so easy to make that modifying one is not an option. Just make it new.

I have always made them with a 1/4" plywood base plate. It's ok but having just cut a piece of 1/4" Plexiglas for another project, this material was on my mind. Plenty of scrap remaining including a piece more than



big enough. An extra hole (the one in the photo) would not hurt anything.

The advantage, of course, is obvious. You can see through it. The Plexiglas is screwed to the wood base rather than the traditional gluing and it worked just fine. Counter sunk screws went in quickly. A trip across the router table produces the slot.

A carefully scribed cursor line at the midpoint makes it complete. I cut forty mortises with it, all but one perfect. The big worry about scratching it during use did not materialize. It will last a long time.

A word of caution when using the router table to cut the slot. Besides the obvious part about setting a piece of material down on a spinning bit and holding on tight, there is an accuracy issue.

The block of wood **MUST** have its inside and outside faces dead parallel. This is easily achieved in the planer. The issue is that the template slot is routed on

the router table with the **OUTSIDE** face against the fence but in use, the **INSIDE** face is clamped to the work. This was an embarrassing discovery a few years ago when all of my demonstrations never fit. A two-degree out of parallel block caused every joint to not be flush by four degrees.

## NEW—GUILD SCHOLARSHIPS

### NEW - GOOW Scholarships

The Guild is happy to announce the availability of two scholarships to advance the skills of someone who is interested in pursuing a career in woodworking. The funds for this scholarship came to us from the Oregon Community Foundation (OCF). Mr. Voss, a shop teacher from Medford, established a Technical Training Scholarship Fund at OCF to support students who want to become a fine craftsman/woman. The OCF came to the Guild to administer these funds because of our expertise in this area, our large and diverse membership, and our contacts within the industry.



### What It Is

The scholarship, valued up to \$3,600, includes the following:

Enrollment in one year of the “Next Level” series of classes. The NL series is somewhat similar to an apprenticeship course and prepares students for enrolling in a Mastery program at various schools around the country. It gives them the basic skills to work with local professionals to further enhance their skills. For more details on the NL classes see <http://www.guildoforegonwoodworkers.com/page-1272418>. The value of this is approximately \$2,000.

One year of unlimited shop use (\$600 value)

Up to 4 other non-NL classes – one per quarter (value up to \$1,000)

If we are successful this first year with managing these funds and the Guild is willing to continue, OCF indicated that they would discuss follow-on funds in future years. This would allow us to enroll additional students or continue supporting existing students.

### Requirements

The requirements are set by the OCF and by Mr. Voss’s estate.

An Oregon high school graduate (or GED)

Shows extraordinary technical or artistic potential.

Demonstrates financial need.

### How To Apply

If you are interested in this scholarship or know of someone who would qualify, contact Roger Crooks, Gig Lewis, Alexander Anderson or Tim Moore. We will then have a brief interview and explain the program in more detail. We would like to make a decision by year end.

This is open to all Guild members and their children. If you know of a non-Guild member who might qualify, please have them contact us also. We want to identify the best candidates for these scholarships.

The luck of the Internet landed me a wonderful company I had to share with you, Multi-Craft Plastics near 72nd and I-5 in Tigard. Unbelievably low prices for the same product, compared to what I was finding. And very helpful people, willing to set products out after hours, etc.

Here's a scarf rack I built (two copies) for a customer. She has a LOT of scarfs.

There's something ethereal about those rods. Makes me want to find some exotic application that requires lighting them.

Be wary about bending strength. These were 1/2" rods. 5/8" would have been a little better but they worked for this lightweight application.

## ARE YOU WOODWORKING LITERATE?

What should you as a woodworker know at a minimum so someone doesn't think that you don't know anything?

When you refer to a joint as a "mortise and *ten-don*" or call every groove, slot or channel in the wood a "dado", or use Woodcrafters and Woodcraft interchangeably, or refer to the Oregon College of Arts and Crafts, well, your newbie status shows.

That's OK!! But it's time to learn.

If you want to take the edge off of it just a little, take a look at the list of questions below. If you don't know some of the answers, these are good things to research to improve your vernacular and presentation as a woodworker.

These items are a sample of subjects well worth

your personal investment of time to learn more about.

Larry Wade poses the following questions:

- ◆ Who are Lie Nielsen, Lee Valley, Blue Spruce, Bridge City, Wenzloff, Gramercy?
- ◆ Who are John Economaki, Dave Jeske, Garrett Hack and other tool makers?
- ◆ Who is Gary Rogowski, Chris Schwarz, Bob Flexner, Jim Tolpin, Brian Boggs and the other 25 most notable contemporary furniture designers?
- ◆ Why do we care about Krenov, Maloof, Nakashima and others in the last hundred years?
- ◆ What styles are Mid-century Modern, Craftsman?
- ◆ What is Japanese woodworking all about, what are their tools and why are they different?
- ◆ How do the major print and video publishers fit in (Taunton, FWW, FHB, PW, Woodsmith), etc?

## ALL GUILD INSTRUCTORS !!

BOB OSWALD

If you are a Guild Safety & Orientation, Machine Skills instructor or a HOST examiner, please read this article.

The accuracy of our shop user records depends on you. If you fall into any of these categories, the last action on your list before you leave the shop is to make the appropriate entries in the Shop User database. Depending on your role, the steps are slightly different as described below.

The process is very simple. In all cases:

- ◆ Select the Shop Attendant button and log in with your lock box code. If you don't have a code, let me know.

Important: When you enter the shop and log in, you should always log in as INSTRUCTOR or HOST EXAMINER. The Shop Users program has automatic update features that will update your own record unless you are logged in as described.

### Safety & Orientation Instructors

When you complete a training session, you need to update the records of all attendees. If you do this BEFORE anyone logs out, it's a very simple process.

- ◆ In the Shop Attendant screen, click the tiny button under the Safety field. On your approval, it will date stamp everyone currently logged in. You're done. You can then group logout everyone.
- ◆ If you come back another day to catch up, you're in for a bit of work. Working from a paper copy list, you must locate each record and select the correct date from the calendar. Definitely a pain.

### Machine Skills Instructors

At the end of your class, you need to update the records of successful attendees. Typically this is only a few people. There is no shortcut. In the Shop Attendant screen, select a member record. Select the machine to be certified with a drop down that puts today's date in the field. Select your name from the authorization list. If you are not on this list, notify me.

### HOST examiner

At the end of your HOST session, you need to update the records of successful attendees. There are two situations. Select the appropriate record in the Shop Attendant screen.

If a person passes all segments:

- ◆ Enter the date in the HOST field.
- ◆ Click the tiny button under the HOST field which will, on your approval, update all core machines with the current date and your name as you enter it.

If someone does not pass the full slate:

- ◆ In this case you would not enter HOST date since it is not complete. You can select a note next to a failed machine indicating the situation. Then,
- ◆ Option 1: Mark the successful machines individually, or
- ◆ Option 2: Use the tiny button to check them all quickly, and then un-check the appropriate machines.

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### From the woodworker

This job was completed by me on 8/2/2015. I redesigned the top so that it will properly support the weight of a child without breaking. The faulty top had been constructed to fit inside the sides with two (2) screws per side supporting the total weight. When a child sat on the top, the top split where the screws were.

The new design has the 3/4" thick plywood top supported by the top of the sides and includes a 3/4" x 1-1/8" maple frame that is fastened in between the sides. This design makes the top structurally stronger than the original construction. The plywood top was wrapped with 1/4" x 3/4" maple strips to hide the plywood edge.

The client didn't request it but, I also replaced the top on the other side of the Discovery Cove. I decided that it was just as easy to make two (2) new tops at the same time, rather than letting another child get hurt while sitting on the other side.

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Yours truly finished a project recently and delivered it to the customer's apartment in downtown Portland. I was doubly rewarded by this simple email from Amy the following day "I couldn't be happier."

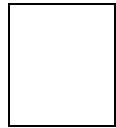
